A BABY BORN SAFELY AMID THE PANDEMIC

A new baby was safely born in South Jakarta in June, assisted by Bidan Riyanti. Safety of midwives also means safety of mothers and babies, and ultimately, safety of childbirth. Safety during the COVID-19 pandemic is a priority for Indonesian Midwives Association (IBI) and United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). Bidan Riyanti's private clinic is one of the midwifery clinics in Jakarta, Tangerang, and Depok (COVID-19 epicentral areas) that received Personnel Protection Equipment (PPE) from UNFPA and the Government of Canada.

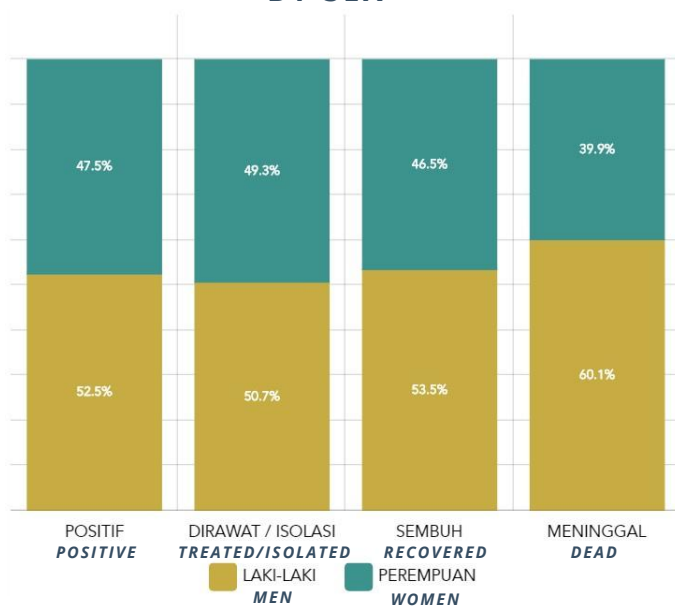

HIGHLIGHTS

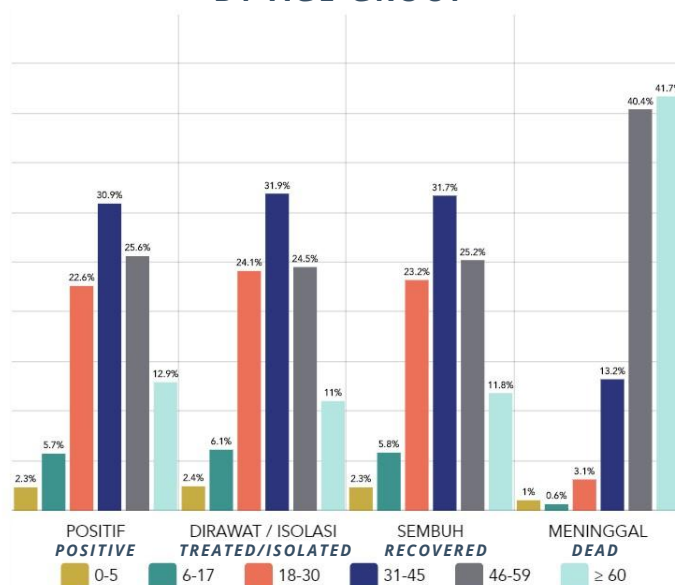
- As of 30 June, the Government of Indonesia announced **56,385 confirmed cases of COVID-19, 2,876 deaths, and 24,806 recovered cases.**
- UNFPA provided PPE to **412 midwifery clinics** in Depok, Tangerang, and South Jakarta and 1,000 Dignity Kits to pregnant women, women in post-delivery period, new-born babies, and gender-based violence (GBV) survivors.
- UNFPA supported the development and dissemination of protocols on **GBV prevention, management, and essential services during COVID-19.**
- UNFPA plays a critical role in both national and UN response as a lead agency for the **National Reproductive Health (RH)/GBV Sub-Cluster and HCT Protection Sector** Co-lead with United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

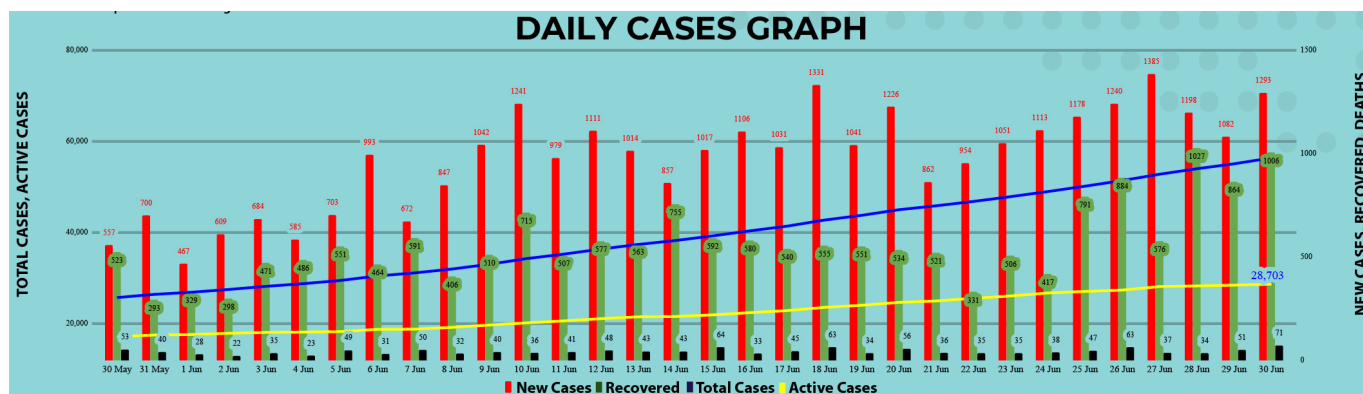


CONFIRMED CASES BY SEX

84% of puskesmas experience reduction in number of visits

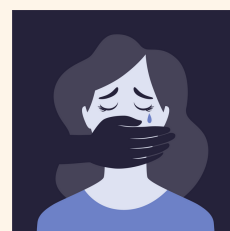


UNMET NEEDS FOR FAMILY PLANNING - POTENTIAL INCREASE

MIDWIVES – CELEBRATE, DEMONSTRATE, MOBILIZE, AND UNITE

15 MAY 2020



This year, we commemorate the International Day of the Midwife under this theme: midwives – celebrate, demonstrate, mobilize, and unite. Celebrating midwives who play key roles in the provision of quality sexual and reproductive health care for women, in many parts of the world, WHO, UNFPA and other partners declare 2020 as the Year of the Nurse and the Midwife.

The COVID-19 pandemic has posed challenges for pregnant women in accessing midwifery care, while midwives strive to provide the best care they can but often leave their own safety as the last priority. Through online education, UNFPA Indonesia has supported IBI in reaching out to field midwives to ensure the continuity of midwifery care for women's reproductive health during the pandemic.

PRIORITIZING YOUTH NEEDS IN NATIONAL COVID-19 RESPONSE

10 JUNE 2020



Ninety percent of young people in Indonesia feel anxious during the COVID-19 pandemic, with social distancing measures forcing schools and workplaces to close. This is one of the findings of an online survey recently conducted by UNFPA Indonesia's Youth Advisory Panel (YAP). Supporting and engaging young people, especially those who have been disproportionately impacted by

the pandemic, is one of UNFPA Indonesia's key focus areas in its COVID-19 response strategy. UNFPA supports the Coordinating Ministry for Human Development and Cultural Affairs (Kemenko PMK) and Ministry of Health (MOH) in developing a National Action Plan to meet the needs of young people in the long term.

REACHING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SURVIVORS AMID THE PANDEMIC

With the COVID-19 pandemic restricting people's movements and weakening protection systems, women and girls are at greater risk of experiencing GBV. UNFPA's latest research expects 31 million additional cases of gender-based violence (GBV) to occur globally if the lockdown continues for at least 6 months. Indonesia, the pandemic has increased GBV cases by 12% according to a

recent online survey by the National Commission for Violence against Women (NCVAW). To ensure GBV survivors can access and receive the necessary services on time, UNFPA has been working closely with the Ministry of Women Empowerment and Child Protection (MOWECP) and Integrated Services Center of the Women and Children Empowerment (P2TP2A) to adjust the protocol on GBV case management and referral pathway during COVID-19 pandemic.

RESULTS RECAP

- **1,000 Kits** delivered to vulnerable women in Jabodetabek area.
- **412 midwifery clinics** received PPEs in Depok, Tangerang, and South Jakarta.
- **132 pregnant women and 368 older persons in Central Sulawesi** received monthly food supplements and vitamins.
- **40 kits** delivered to support safe delivery in Depok, Tangerang, and South Jakarta.
- **9,067 young people** all over Indonesia reached by sexual and reproductive health (SRH) risk communications through social media platforms.

PROGRAMME HIGHLIGHTS

SEXUAL REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH

- Provision of technical support and capacity building to the national organisation of midwives to strengthen **provision of family planning and SRH services**.
- Provision of PPEs to 412 midwifery clinics in Depok, Tangerang and South Jakarta through Indonesian Midwives Association (IBI).
- Provision of **600 Dignity Kits** to pregnant woman, post delivery woman and new baby born through 100 midwifery clinics in collaboration with IBI.
- Distribution of essential logistics support for 132 pregnant mothers in Central Sulawesi in April-June 2020 in collaboration with local non-government organizations (NGOs), Libu Perempuan, Yayasan Kelompok Pejuang Kestaraan Perempuan Sulawesi Tengah (KPKPST), and Yayasan Kerti Praja (YKP).
- **Online SRH services and consultation for young people** are provided by 46 health providers in Yogyakarta through the UNALA programme.

GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

- Provided technical assistance in the development and dissemination of government protocols on **GBV prevention, management, and essential services**.
- Modification of 400 Dignity Kits with additional provision of masks and hand sanitizers, and a distribution plan.
- **Provision of GBV services** for any urgent cases in Central Sulawesi through Women Friendly Spaces in collaboration with YKP, Libu Perempuan, and KPKPST.
- Distributed the **logistics for survival for 368 selected older persons in temporary shelters** in Central Sulawesi Province in April-June 2020 in collaboration with YKP, Libu Perempuan, and KPKPST.
- Provision of **Intimate-Partner Violence Session** to UNFPA Indonesia Country Office staff and United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) staff in collaboration with UN WOMEN and UN Technical Working Group.

HIV/AIDS

- Reached over **60,000 Female Sex Workers** through online outreach and social media, and provided information regarding HIV/AIDS prevention and treatment.
- HIV prevention and services provided to female sex workers in 88 districts.
- HIV outreach services shifted to **virtual support** in March 2020, and online provision of information about HIV and SRH.
- Virtual outreach guidelines and online training materials developed in collaboration with the National Network of Sex Workers (OPSI).
- Series of **virtual training and sharing sessions to peer leaders** were conducted on virtual outreach.
- Infographic and videos on HIV, mental health, and COVID-19 were developed and disseminated via OPSI's social media and network to minimize COVID-19 infection among Female Sex Workers.

YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

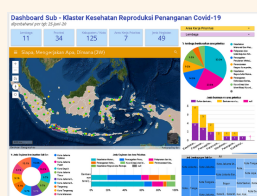
- Supported the Coordinating Ministry of Human Development and Culture (Kemenko PMK) in **prioritizing adolescents and youth needs** in the multi-stakeholder government response to the pandemic.
- Chaired the Interagency Network for Youth Development (IANYD) to coordinate with UN agencies in responses targeting young people.
- Youth engagement through serial **online survey, online focus group discussions (FGDs) and social media listening** to understand the needs of young people during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Launched **online health campaign** via the community of practice (COP) involving 26 influencers and young creative digital content producers across Indonesia.
- Promoted youth leadership in addressing the COVID-19 pandemic through online public discussions, online gatherings (webinars), and counseling for young people affected by the pandemic.

DATA IN HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

- Facilitating ongoing communication and information sharing between the National Disaster Management Authority (BNPB) and Indonesia Statistics Office (BPS).
- Developed **Geographic Information System (GIS) mapping for 100 midwives services** in 3 affected areas (South Jakarta, Depok City, Tangerang City).
- Developed and regularly update the **3W (Who does what, where) information tool** for GBV and RH Sub-Clusters.
- Provided technical assistance to the Center of Data, Information, and Disaster communication (BNPB) in collecting and analyzing COVID-19 related data.
- Provided support for the Information Management and Data Working group along with UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) for better administration of COVID-19 related data.

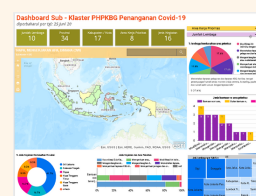

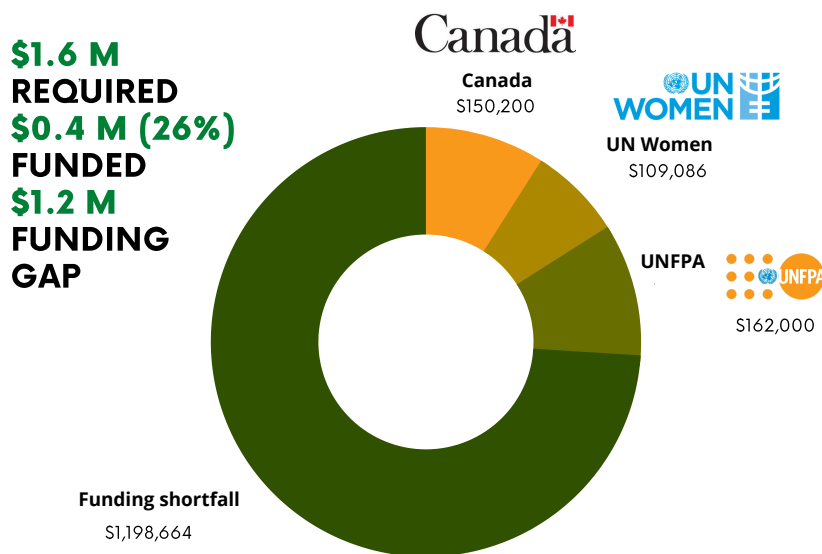

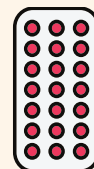


FUNDING SITUATION
